Story Behind the Songs...

This morning we will be singing two songs taken from the Psalms. The first, **God Be Merciful To Me** is taken from Psalm 51. This particular Psalm was written by King David after committing adultery with Bathsheba & being confronted by the prophet Nathan about his sin. When we remember his sin, let us dwell most upon his penitence, and upon the long series of chastisements which rendered the after part of his life such a mournful history.

The second, Psalm 42, is **Lord, From Sorrows Deep I Call**. It is the cry of a man far removed from the outward ordinances and worship of God, sighing for the long loved house of his God; and at the same time it is the voice of a spiritual believer, under depressions, longing for the renewal of the divine presence, struggling with doubts and fears, but yet holding his ground by faith in the living God. Most of the Lord's family have sailed on the sea which is here so graphically described. It is probable that David's flight from Absalom may have been the occasion for composing this Maschil.
