I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day

The text for this hymn is based off of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's 1863 poem, "Christmas Bells." The poem itself was inspired by several painful events in Longfellow's life. For one, his son Charles joined the Union army without telling Henry before he left. Eventually, Charles was severely wounded in battle. Around the same time, Longfellow's wife, Frances, tragically died when her dress accidentally caught fire from a burning candle, which left Henry badly burned as well. Longfellow wrote his poem on Christmas Day, telling of the despair in his heart as he heard the Christmas bells play. The third verse, which says, "And in despair, I bowed my head: 'There is no peace on earth,' 'For hate is strong and mocks the song of peace on earth, good will to men,'" shows the depth of despair Longfellow experienced. Fortunately, this poem ends on an encouraging note, which shows the faith and hope in God that Longfellow had in the face of despair.
